Additionally, we have included the anticipated level of difficulty to develop each grant proposal. A key is provided below for reference:

Key: Level of Difficulty (LOD)	
<b>Simple</b>	A simple level of difficulty indicates an application that may take 8 hours or less to develop and can likely be accomplished “in-house” with minimal effort/allocation of internal resources.
<b>Medium</b>	A medium level of difficulty indicates an application process that will take a more substantial allocation of internal resources to accomplish and might possibly require outside assistance (20-70 hours to develop application).
<b>Complex</b>	A complex level of difficulty indicates a VERY competitive opportunity, with a small success rate and intensive grant-development and positioning.

**Table 3** includes a list of grants that are on the horizon, but NOFAs have not been released. Success rates, links to past awards, and anticipated level of difficulty are not listed in Table 3.
